Collective Worship

As a Church school, Collective Worship is an important time during which we can share in celebrating God's love and learning more about our Christian faith through stories, songs, drama and prayer. We offer a Christian understanding of the world and the place of humanity in it, and this is reflected in our worship. In particular, it is reflected in the everyday life of the school, respectful of the beliefs of others and of other faiths, but confident in our own faith.

The Christian values we promote through collective worship are the foundation of our school ethos. We have 3 core values: Respect, Care & Courage.

We are supported by our local church community who lead a collective worship assembly every week. Our local church, Holy Trinity, is located a short walk from the school.

We hold special services such as Harvest, Remembrance, Christmas, Easter and School Performances.

Each week we acknowledge and reward the children for achievements both in and out of school, promoting the ethos of the school that all children are valued and learning is celebrated.

<u>Aims</u>

Collective worship is central to the life of Trinity school and is:

- Coherent with our core purpose and vision
- Organised and planned to take account of; ages, aptitude and family background of pupils and also provides learning opportunities that contributes to the learning in the curriculum
- Inclusive and provides opportunities for everyone to participate as well as attend
- Conducted in an environment conducive to worship.

Inclusion

The organisation and language of collective worship allows for different levels of response. At Trinity we have pupils with widely differing experiences of worship, some will go to Church regularly, others will have no experiences beyond school and still others belong to and worship in the precepts of another faith. At Trinity we aim to provide pupils with a secure context in which to experience Christian worship and reflect upon the impact of worship in their own lives and the lives of the people around us.

Key elements of Collective Worship at Trinity



Collective worship is a powerful opportunity to provide for our pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development. Acts of Collective worship at Trinity will include some of these elements:

- be concerned with the worship of God, use the Bible as a source book, reflect on the importance of Jesus and his teachings
- have a sense of occasion
- invite participation
- provide an opportunity for participants to explore their inner feelings; through formal prayer, children's' own prayers and silent reflection
- provide an opportunity for the children to consider the purpose and meaning of life
- reflect the cycle of the Anglican year: Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter and Pentecost
- provide opportunities for individuals and the community to share matters of importance
- celebrate beliefs, values and ideals
- promote Trinity's core Christian values of Care, Respect, Courage and explore the rationale for them
- foster a sense of belonging to the Trinity School community
- be varied in style and include different forms of expression e.g art, music, story, dance
- celebrate pupils' talents and achievements
- mark the major festivals of other faiths
- invite visitors from other faiths invited to share their values and beliefs

Curriculum Time

At Trinity we have an act of worship for our pupils every day. During a typical week there will be worship as follows:

<u>Thursday</u>	Picture News Each week, pupils reflect on an image about a current news story. Resources are designed to provide opportunities for children to learn from our world and develop respect for others beliefs, feelings and faiths. They encourage exploration, discussion, challenge and inspire children to learn.Pupils are divided into EYFS + KS1 and then KS2 to enable current affairs to be discussed and reflected upon in an age appropriate way. Legal Requirements



Arrangements for collective worship in Church schools are the responsibility of the governors in consultation with the Headteacher. Church schools must fulfil three main legal requirements for collective worship:

- provide an act of worship for all pupils every day
- ensure that collective worship is in accordance with the trust deed of the school
- make it clear that parents may withdraw their children from all or any part of collective worship.

Right of withdrawal

Pupils are expected to attend acts of Collective worship. However, any parent can request permission for their child to be excused from attending religious worship and the school will make alternative arrangements for the supervision of the child during the period concerned. Parents do not have to explain or give reasons for this. This complies with the 1944 Education Act and the 1988 Education Reform Act.

Evaluation

Evaluation of the impact and effectiveness of collective worship – whether undertaken at school or in the Parish Church – is undertaken during each academic year by the Vicar and Headteacher in consultation with all other interested parties, including, teachers, pupils, parents and governors.
