A short vowel sound is simply the sound (not the letter name) 'a', 'e', 'i', 'o', 'u'	What happens to words with 'er' at the end? Investigate words ending in 'er'. Where is the short vowel sound within the word? What do you notice? The double letters protect the short vowel sound in two syllable words. Explore two syllable words and find words where the double letters protect the short vowel sound.
